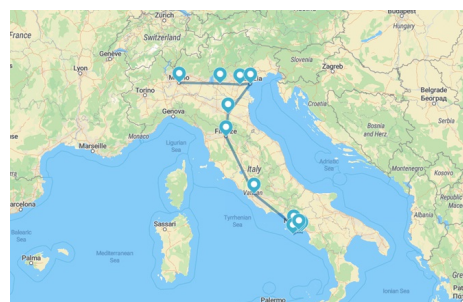

● DAY 1 · CITY OF ORIGIN - MILAN

Flight departure from the city of origin to Milan. Arrival and rental car pick-up.

And here your adventure on Italian soil begins!

The road trip through Italy kicks off in the mighty and attractive city of Milan. Capital of fashion and design, and many other things, visiting it always is a great idea. From Charlemagne to Napoleon, many historical figures set their eyes on this vibrant city that masterfully combines a turbulent past with a modern and creative present. A gentle stroll along the city centre streets will reveal an important architectural and artistic heritage. Must-sees include the Piazza del Duomo, with the incredible Cathedral; the Royal Palace and the entrance arch to the Vittorio Emanuele II Gallery; the Basilica of Santa Maria delle Grazie, which houses the priceless "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci; the Teatro de La Scala, one of the most important opera houses in the world; and the bohemian and artistic Navigli, a buzzing waterfront area where great food, art, nightlife and a fantastic atmosphere are guaranteed... Enjoy a mouthwatering dinner by the canal! In the beautiful Sempione Park, one of the main green areas of the city, you can admire the Sforzesco Castle (which houses interesting art galleries) and the Peace Arch. But Milan is much more. The city is a true paradise for shopping lovers, who flock here from all corners of the world attracted by its infinite range of stores, artisan workshops, avant-garde outlets, showrooms and high-end boutiques... Make sure you take a leisurely stroll around the glamorous Quadrilatero d'Oro! For art lovers, we recommend the Brera district, with its must-visit Pinacoteca. Dotted with cosy cafés and terraces, Brera is perfect for savouring the delicious typical Milanese antipasti, as famous as they are delicious. Our final recommendation takes us to the City, where you can discover the most modern face of the city.

Overnight stay in Milan.

● DAY 2 · MILAN - VERONA

Milan is an excellent starting point to set off on the 'Top to Toe of Italy' tour. Our next stop will be the romantic city of Verona, located about two hours away.

Few places in the world have such a seductive atmosphere. Known as the city of Romeo and Juliet, the lovers immortalised by Shakespeare, Verona is the perfect place to round off an unforgettable day. Take a leisurely stroll along its enchanting streets in search of the eternal lovers and head to the House of Juliet, a magnificent twelfth-century palace which is the supposed residence of the Capulets, where you can climb up to the mythical balcony from where she spoke with Romeo (Via Capello, 23). Nearby is the Nogarola Palace, believed to be Romeo's house.

But this city of Roman monuments, Renaissance palaces and baroque churches has much more to offer to the traveller. From the River Adige, which runs through the city, you can marvel at unique sunsets. Cross the bridges that join both parts of the city and head to the stunning historic quarter, declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. And as a finishing touch, the elegant Piazza dei Signori, where you can have a coffee and a delicious "pandoro" or enjoy a romantic candlelit dinner.

Overnight stay in Verona.

● DAY 3 · VERONA - PADUA - VENICE

Further time to explore the romantic city of Verona: the Arena di Verona: Amphitheatre, Via Mazzini and its chic boutiques, Piazza Erbe with the Lamberti tower and the Palazzo Comunale, the Scaligieri arch, and Piazza Bra... We hit the road again, this time to discover Venice - located about 120 kilometres away - a unique city which, along with Verona, always appears in the rankings of the most beautiful and romantic cities in the world. On the way, we recommend that you stop off at the university city of Padua and enjoy its spectacular artistic and cultural heritage. The city, known for its connection with Saint Anthony, is dotted with magnificent churches and civil buildings which devotedly guard major works by artists such as Giotto, Luini and Mantegna. The Musei Civici agli Eremitani and Scrovegni Chapel, commissioned by Enrico Scrovegni in memory of his father, are must-visits. The Chapel, created by the brilliant Giotto, is famous for its humanist approach, which was to represent a revolutionary approach in contrast with the artistic dictates of the Middle Ages. Take a leisurely stroll through the lively squares and visit the Basilica of Saint Anthony of Padua (with the saint's tomb and the Equestrian Statue of Gattamelata by Donatello), the cathedral baptistery, the magnificent Palazzo della Ragione with its wonderful collection of fifteenth-century frescoes... And let's not forget the beautiful botanical gardens, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and considered some of the oldest and most beautiful in Europe. Say farewell to the city with a delicious "gelato" in busy Plaza Prato della Valle. Onward with our journey. There are now only 40 kilometres between us and the captivating city of Venice. One glance at the four-kilometre-long Grand Canal, which is criss-crossed by bridges as famous as the Rialto, and you will realise why this city is unique in the world. (Note: Line 1 of local water taxi Vaporetto runs the full length of the Grand Canal. The legendary Rialto Bridge and its surroundings feature markets and small shops where you can find beautiful souvenirs). End this unforgettable day with a trip on a gondola underneath the Bridge of Sighs. Overnight stay in Venice.

● DAY 4 · VENICE - ISLANDS OF MURANO AND BURANO - VENICE

Again we wake up in a magical city, which shifts between real and dreamlike in time with the rhythm of the water. To this day, it's still surprising just how audacious the Venetians were in daring to square up to the high tides and design a city full of marble palaces in the middle of a lagoon. The city, famous for its carnivals, is also a renowned centre for art, music, and Italian cuisine. After breakfast, we set out to explore the city. Our route will need to take in unique sites like the Palazzo Ducale, the Museo Correr with the Biblioteca Nazionale Marciana, the Gallerie dell'Accademia, the monastery on San Giorgio Maggiore... Venice is also famous for the captivating Piazza San Marco, a true treasure trove waiting to be discovered. The image of doves flying over the imposing basilica is famous worldwide. Soak up the atmosphere that for centuries has attracted major artists and writers to Caffè Florian. And climb up Il Campanile bell tower to enjoy one of the best views in the city. Around the square lies a maze of old and romantic canals dotted with palaces and golden domes that remind the traveller of a golden age in which the Republic of Venice was an important Mediterranean power. If you have time, we recommend a boat trip to the islands of Burano, famous for its fine lace, and Murano, known for its excellent glass crafts. (Note: Cars are not allowed on the islands. You can reach the islands in a "vaporetto" (local water taxi). The journey from the quay to the islands takes about 30 minutes. Tour not included). The day ends with a glass of Aperol in one of the typical osterie (taverns). Overnight stay in Venice.

● DAY 5 · VENICE - BOLOGNA

After a tasty breakfast by a Venetian canal, we'll set off for Bologna, the land of Dante, known throughout the world for its fascinating historical and cultural heritage and for being home to Europe's oldest university in Europe and the recent Bologna Process for higher education. (Note: It takes about 1 hour 30 minutes to get back to Padua on the A57 and A4. Afterwards, take the ring road in the direction of Bologna and then the A13 heading southwest. If you have enough time, take a detour to Ferrara, whose historic quarter has been recognised as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO). And then we'll get to Bologna! Sheltered to the west by the Apennines and to the east by the Adriatic Sea, its urban centre reflects the architectural, cultural and literary splendour of a glorious past built by the city's noble families. It boasts a rich heritage and a truly marvellous medieval quarter (one of the best preserved in the world) with twenty towers.

Any suggestions?

Enjoy laid-back walks along Via dell'Indipendenza; discover the leaning towers of Asinelli and Garisenda, the palaces of Podestà, Poggi and dei Banchi; visit the Basilica di San Petronio; attend an opera at the Teatro Comunale; or stroll around the fascinating exhibitions at the International Music Museum or at the Pinacoteca Nazionale... The cultural and creative universe of the city is fascinating. Included in the network of Creative Cities promoted by UNESCO, the city gives travellers the chance to enjoy interesting concerts, activities and festivals. Check out the calendar of events before embarking on your journey! This 'Grand Tour' is also a culinary journey into the different nuances and excellent products of Italian cuisine. Make sure you try some Parmesan cheese, balsamic oil from Modena and the ever-popular prosciutto.

Overnight stay in Bologna.

● DAY 6 · BOLOGNA - FLORENCE

We'll leave Bologna behind today to visit the universal Florence, another of the major artistic and cultural cities in the country. (Note: To get to Florence, head out of the city in a westerly direction and take the A1. From here, there are around 110 kilometres to Florence). Decipher its artistic genius, unravel its impetuous humanistic spirit, and visit its most emblematic landmarks, museums and streets. Donatello, Masaccio, Botticelli, Michelangelo, Leonardo, Raphael and Dante are just some of the illustrious names forever linked to this city. You'll soon discover their legacy. Are you ready? The Duomo neighbourhood is an excellent starting point. Here you can admire the Cathedral of Santa Maria del Fiore, located in the very heart of the city, and discover its bell-tower, the baptistery and the famous Gates of Paradise. Around the Duomo are a wealth of beautiful piazzas, churches, palaces and museums. It's definitely worth popping into the neighbourhoods of San Lorenzo and San Marco, in Medici territory, and visiting the Gallery dell'Accademia, home to Michelangelo's world-famous David. From there we can head to the Piazza della Repubblica and stroll along the palace-lined streets up to the Santa Maria Novella area. Overnight stay in Florence.

● DAY 7 · FLORENCE

More time to explore this fascinating city that endears itself to the traveller with its art galleries, its outstanding businesses, its unique boutiques and its stylish restaurants... You'll be amazed to see how art permeates everything and becomes a way of life. After wandering around the most historic streets, we'll head towards Via de Tornabuoni, an elegant shopping area full of designer boutiques and some of the most stylish parts of the city. This area is also home to the famous Uffizi gallery. And for lovers of another type of Italian art, two additional suggestions: the Gucci Museum and the Salvatore Ferragamo Museum. Don't leave Florence without strolling through the bustling Oltrarno neighbourhood, visiting the magnificent Palazzo Pitti and its beautiful Boboli gardens, or enjoying a snack with a view near the Ponte Vecchio. A day trip? Make your way over to Fiesole, a quiet village full of charm and located just 9 kilometres from the city. You'll fall in love with its Renaissance villas, its views of Florence and its laid-back atmosphere. Overnight stay in Florence.

● DAY 8 · FLORENCE - ROME

After enjoying the ever-vibrant city of Florence, we'll set off to the imperial and historical city of Rome. (Note: The fastest route to Rome will take just over 3 hours on the A1 and E35).

Known as the Eternal City, built on seven hills and nerve centre of the Roman Empire, the vibrant Italian capital is an authentic open-air museum that fuses the beauty of ancient Rome with the attractions of Renaissance, Baroque and modern Rome. A heritage that has made this stunning Italian city one of the most popular tourist destinations in the world. Stroll through its historic centre - declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO - and discover some of the most impressive monuments of ancient times. Among its classic treasures are the Coliseum, a grandiose amphitheatre inaugurated in 80 AD by Emperor Tito for gladiator fights, and the jaw-dropping Pantheon, a building that changed the course of world architecture. Another of our recommendations is to visit the Via Forums and discover the forums of Caesar, Augustus and Trajan. Much of the appeal of Rome lies in its magnificent squares, such as Piazza Venezia, Campidoglio, Popolo, Piazza della Rotonda, Minerva, Piazza Spagna, with its fabulous steps... And if you want to admire privileged views of the city, head to Monte Gianicolo and marvel at one of the best panoramas around. In the evening, you can savour Rome's delicious cuisine and soak up its ever-bustling street life in the picturesque neighbourhood of Trastevere.

Overnight stay in Rome.

● DAY 9 · ROME

More time to continue exploring the amazing city of Rome. Today, we recommend a trip to the Vatican City. The smallest state on the planet and the epicentre of Christianity, the Vatican City is also part of UNESCO's privileged list. It's a fascinating journey into the history of art and religion. You can visit the fabulous St. Peter's Square, presided over by the imposing Basilica of the same name, where you can admire works as famous as Michelangelo's Pietà and Bernini's dome and baldachin. Here, the Pope addresses thousands of believers in masses that attract Catholics from all four corners of the globe. Set aside some time to admire the magnificent treasures of the Vatican, as it's one of the world's largest 'art museums'. Must-sees are the Sistine Chapel, which was created by Michelangelo, Botticelli, Perugino and Ghirlandaio; the magnificent Vatican Museums; and the idyllic Vatican Gardens, a place of rest and meditation of Popes since the 13th century. Meanwhile, a visit to the catacombs and clandestine churches will let you explore the origins of Christianity. We'll continue the day discovering the essence of Rome along the bustling retail arteries of Via Condotti and Via del Corso, or at the restaurants of Campo dei Fiori. The charming terraces dotted along Rome's streets are the ideal place to soak up daily life and taste the city's world-famous gelatos. Before you leave, make sure you'll return to Rome one day by throwing a coin back into the legendary Fontana di Trevi.

Overnight stay in Rome.

● DAY 10 · ROME - NAPLES

After breakfast and a final stroll around majestic Rome, we'll head back on the road. The last stretch of the Grand Tour in Italy will take you to the vibrant city of Naples, the imposing Vesuvius volcano, the beautiful Amalfi coast, the ancient city of Pompeii and - optionally - the stylish island of Capri, if you fancy swapping the car for a boat for a few hours. (Note: Ferry crossing and entrance to the Pompeii site and Vesuvius not included in the price). The A1 takes you directly from Rome to Naples. The fastest route is about 225 kilometres and includes some tolls. When planning the day, bear in mind that the traffic gets really heavy in the afternoon, especially at the entrances and exits to both cities.

We'll spend today exploring Naples, the third largest in Italy and one of the oldest, most artistic and most surprising in the country. An ancient city that seduces the traveller with its street culture, its passion for life and its beautiful expansive bay with views to the imposing Mount Vesuvius. And this sea was the very gateway for the various peoples and empires that dominated this beautiful region from ancient times on. Discover its magnificent historic quarter (declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site), its famous archaeological treasures, its elegant castles and palaces, its baroque churches and its outstanding museums... What's more, its authentic streets and piazzas give the city a truly unique atmosphere. Founded by the Greeks in the fifth century BC, it was over time conquered by Romans, Normans, Bavarians, Spanish viceroys, Bourbons... The result is a genuine way of experiencing the seductive yet chaotic lifestyle, an eclectic fusion of architecture and monuments, unique traditions and culinary delights that will take you on a journey stimulating all five senses. You'll step foot into one of the country's gastronomic temples, where you can savour some of the very best pizzas, fish dishes, pastas and coffees in the whole of Italy. (Note: There are tours of underground Naples. Under the city streets is a fascinating network of catacombs, burial chambers, Greek grottoes and magnificent ruins. Admission not included. Check opening hours).

Overnight stay in Naples.

● DAY 11 · NAPLES - HERCULANEUM - POMPEII - THE VESUVIUS - NAPLES

Today, we recommend a fascinating "stroll through history". We'll start the day in the ancient city of Pompeii, one of the most visited archaeological sites in the world and which was buried after the violent eruption of Vesuvius in AD 79. Located about 30-40 minutes by car from Naples, the visit to Pompeii will give you an insight into the structure and customs of a city from the classic period. (Note: Leave Naples on the A3, take the exit for Pompeii and follow the signs to Pompeii Scavi. The car parks are well signposted. We recommend around 3 hours for the visit). Once there, your sight will be drawn to the imposing Vesuvius. It's still baffling today to imagine how a dense mantle of ash and "lapilli" (fragments of lava) buried the flourishing city and its thousands of inhabitants for seventeen centuries. Time seems to have come to a standstill in this ancient Roman city, forming a perfectly preserved outdoor museum. Without a doubt, one of the most striking images on the entire route will be at the Granai del Foro (the forum granary), where you'll see body casts that were made in the late 19th century by pouring plaster into the hollows left by disintegrated bodies. A place that provokes recollection and reflection on life. (Note: You can pay for an audio guide or join a guided tour). En route back to Naples, we recommend stopping off at the ruins of the seaside town of Herculaneum, which suffered a similar fate to Pompeii after the eruption of Vesuvius. Perfectly preserved, it boasts some amazing archaeological remains. (Note: This site is smaller than Pompeii, so we recommend 90 minutes for a decent visit). After having lunch at a typical local restaurant and tasting the famous Vesuvian wines cultivated in fertile volcanic earth, we'll head off to explore the majestic Vesuvius itself. Vesuvius National Park, declared a Biosphere Reserve, is open to visits. Here you can climb up to the 1,281-metre volcano, the only active one on continental Europe. Possibility of signing up to a guided tour. From the car park at the summit, an 860-metre-long path leads to the crater. In spring and summer, you can do the full itinerary. In winter, though, seeing as the days are shorter and the Vesuvius National Park closes at 3 pm, it's difficult to include this last visit in the itinerary. On top of that, weather conditions make it difficult to access Vesuvius. Overnight stay in Naples.

● DAY 12 · NAPLES - AMALFI COAST (ATRANI - RAVELLO / VILLA RUFOLO - AMALFI - POSITANO - SORRENTO)

Departure towards the famous Amalfi Coast and the Gulf of Sorrento, one of the most beautiful places in the world and located on the shores of the Mediterranean, unsurprisingly declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. Ahead is a photo-friendly panoramic road that runs parallel to the coastline and that at every curve reveals stunning vertical landscapes of cliffs plummeting into the sea, mysterious grottoes, underground galleries, breath-taking bays and picturesque villages with genuine architecture that seem trapped in time. Discover one of the most glamorous coastlines in the world at your own pace thanks to your hire car! Frequented by celebrities from around the world, its fame dates back centuries, when it was chosen by the Roman Caesars as a place of rest. Get ready to discover outstanding landscapes and stunning pastel-coloured villages perched on seemingly impossible vertical drops, framed between a deep blue sky and a turquoise sea, and sheltered among vineyards, lemon groves, olive trees and bougainvillea. You'll have three days ahead to fully enjoy the scenery and the cuisine. Soak up the authentic Italian dolce vita! Off we go! Our first stop will be in Atrani, where we'll be able to taste the famous "scialatielli", a pasta dish typical of this village. The itinerary then takes us to the elegant town of Ravello, with a visit to Villa Rufolo, whose beauty inspired Richard Wagner in the past. Its fabulously lush gardens command magnificent views over the sea. (Note: Admission not included. The town currently plays host to interesting concerts). If you have time, head to Villa Cimbrone, about 600 metres from the Piazza del Duomo. Converted into a luxury hotel, its "Terrazzo dell'Infinito" also offers incredible views over the Gulf of Salerno. Onward journey to Amalfi, one of the oldest and most powerful maritime republics of Italy. Small and manageable, you can stroll around the town in half an hour. Don't miss the stunning Duomo di Sant'Andrea! Our next stop will be Positano. Known as the Pearl of the Amalfi Coast and perched on an almost impossible slope, Positano has for centuries fascinated tourists, artists and writers with its magical atmosphere, its narrow alleys and its charming shops where you can find everything from handmade ceramics to haute couture fashion... Stunning and exclusive in equal measures, its steep streets, flanked by pastel-coloured villas, descend to caress a beautiful pebble beach. We'll then head back on the road to Sorrento. (Note: If you have time, between Amalfi and Sorrento you can visit Praiano, an old fishing village converted into a pleasant holiday resort, and Conca dei Marini, where you can visit the Emerald Grotto. (Note: Visit not included. Please check schedules). Take advantage of the stop-off to savour the delicious "sfogliatella", a delicious puff pastry filled with ricotta. We'll round off this amazing tour along the incredible Amalfi Coast in Sorrento. Overnight stay in Sorrento.

● DAY 13 · SORRENTO - CAPRI (OPTIONAL) - SORRENTO - CASTELLAMMARE DI STABIA - NAPLES

We'll have a few hours now to enjoy Sorrento and its surroundings. Sorrento was in the past the favourite destination of the Patricians and the "garden of the king" for the Bourbons, while for centuries it has been a must-visit for tourists coming to the Amalfi Coast. From the heights, Sorrento looks proudly out at the Gulf of Naples, Vesuvius and the island of Capri. A must-do is a leisurely stroll around the area of Piazza Tasso, in the heart of town, where its narrow streets are always full of life. Corso Italia turns into a pedestrian street and runs through the historic quarter of the town. Another fabulous excursion is to the cloisters of the Chiesa di San Francesco (Via San Francesco). In the summer months, the cloisters regularly host interesting concerts. If on the second day of the trip you weren't able to visit the exclusive island of Capri, today you can do so. (Note: The journey takes about 25 minutes). Capri retains the charm that made it famous among important dignitaries of the Roman Empire. A natural paradise dotted with exquisite villas, Roman ruins and crystal-clear waters... Don't miss the Marina Grande, the island of Capri and the famous Blue Grotto! (Note: Tour not included. Access to the Grotto is with a guided tour and weather permitting). From Anacapri you can take a chairlift to the top of Mount Solaro, from where you can enjoy spectacular views of the whole island. (Note: We recommend returning to Sorrento in the early afternoon). On your way to Naples, and if you have time, you can stop at Castellammare di Stabia, a modern destination that was a summer resort for the wealthiest Romans. Here you can visit the Arianna and San Marcos villas. Back in Naples, we'll bid farewell to this fascinating trip by savouring the local cuisine at a renowned restaurant and enjoying a typical limoncello. Overnight stay in Naples.

● DAY 14 · NAPLES - CITY OF ORIGIN

You can buy it online, at kiosks, at the city's tourist information offices and at the main attractions and museums covered by the card.
- 1. The transport card for Venice and its islands is the best way to get around the city, either by water or by land. It gives you access to the public transport network of Venice, which includes the famous vaporetti along the canals, the islands and Lido, and the ACTV urban bus network on the mainland, Mestre and Marghera (it doesn't give you access to ACTV transport lines to/from Venice Marco Polo Airport, lines 16, 19, 21 and the Casino and Alilaguna water buses). 1.1. The duration of the transport card begins when it's first used. From then on, you can use it for the specified time: 1, 2, 3 or 7 consecutive days. 1.2. To use public transport services in Venice, you can get the transport card at the ACTV automatic vending machines located throughout the city. 1.3. The price includes the transport of a piece of luggage where the sum of length/width/height is less than 150 centimetres. 1.4. Children under six years old go free on all public transport in Venice. 2. The Venezia Unica City Pass offers free and skip-the-line access to the main museums and churches in Venice, with savings of up to 28%. 2.1. The must-see attractions that you can enter for free with the Venezia Unica City Pass card are: - Venice Ducal Palace. - Three of the civic museums of the Marciana Area (San Marcos City Pass mode): Correr Museum, National Archaeological Museum, monumental rooms of the Marciana Library; or ten of the civic museums of Venice (City Pass Completa mode): Correr Museum, Archaeological Museum National, monumental rooms of the Marciana Library, Ca'Rezzonico, Mocenigo Palace, Carlo Goldoni House, Ca'Pesaro, Murano Glass Museum, Burano Lace Museum and Natural History Museum. - Three or sixteen of the churches included in the Chorus, depending on the mode selected. You can find the Chorus Pass churches on this link. - Querini Stampalia Foundation. 2.2. The modes are: 2.2.1. San Marcos City Pass: includes access to the Doge's Palace, three of the civic museums of the Marciana Area, three of the Chorus churches, the Querini Stampalia Foundation and the Venice Casino. 2.2.2. And City Pass Completa: includes access to the Doge's Palace, ten of the civic museums of Venice, sixteen of the Chorus churches, the Querini Stampalia Foundation and the Jewish Museum. 3. The Venezia Unica City Pass lets you enter each attraction once and is valid for seven consecutive days from the time it is first used. 4. To activate the card and enter any of the attractions for free, just show the voucher at the ticket office. 5. The Venezia Unica City Pass is available for children over six years old. Most of the city's attractions have free admission for children under six years old.
- Parking in central Florence. The best way to enjoy Florence's historic centre is to park your car and explore the old town by foot. Please note that car parks in the city centre are usually more expensive. Depending on your hotel's location, here are some recommendations. There is a public car park in Piazzale Michelangelo, very close to the centre. It is usually filled early in the day due to its location. Another option is to leave your car in one of the car parks outside the city centre and take public transport, such as the tram or bus. For example, you could park in the Villa Costanza car park off the A1 motorway and, from there, take tram # 1 to the city centre. Near the centre, you'll find parking in Via del Sansavino and Via del Gelsomino. Another option is to go to the car park in Firenze Impruneta (formerly called Firenze Certosa), and from there take bus 37 to central Florence in 20 minutes. In the Firenze Parcheggi Sp section you'll find a list of car parks managed by the Firenze Parcheggi Spa public agency.
- Explore Rome at your own pace and without standing in long lines with the OMNIA Vatican and Rome Card that offers free and skip-the-line access to the main attractions of Rome and the Vatican (the Colosseum, Roman Forum, St. Peter's Basilica and the Sistine Chapel) as well as allowing unlimited public transport access. The card includes free admission to the following points of tourist interest: Vatican Museums, Sistine Chapel, Basilica of St. John Lateran, Mamertine Prison, Rome Tourist Bus (3 days) and St. Peter's Basilica. In addition to the above you can choose two of the following attractions: the Colosseum, Roman Forum and Palatine Hill, Capitoline Museums, Castel Sant'Angelo and/or Borghese Gallery. Another option is the Roma Pass card, a tourist card that allows you to access the main attractions at a discount and use unlimited public transport for 2 or 3 days. In addition to the discounts themselves, the Colosseum has a queue reserved for cardholders, which

will save you from its long lines. These can be purchased at tourist information booths and at all participating museums and sites.

- Driving in Naples and/or the Amalfi Coast: 1. We do not recommend driving around the city of Naples, more than anything due to the traffic and having to find car parks, which are often away from tourist areas. 2. On the Amalfi Coast there are two parking options: private parking in a car park, which is expensive, or paid car parks which use automatic machines or the "Easy Park" app in the areas demarcated by the blue line. 3. We advise arriving early to avoid traffic although this is unavoidable, due to the narrow and winding roads. Drive with caution and avoid rush hour.

- The proposed excursions and tours for each day are purely suggestions, as you can tailor the trip to suit your times, tastes and needs.

- A credit card is considered a guarantee, so sometimes you will need one for check-in at hotels.

- Hotels usually have cots available. Otherwise, babies will have to share a bed with an adult.

- To pick up your rental car, you'll need a credit (not debit) card in the name of the person who made the booking, who must also be the named driver of the vehicle.

- Consult the necessary documentation to enter the destinations visited and for transit in the countries where air stopovers are made.

- Suggested round-trip ferry rides are optional and not included in the final price. If you intend to take the car on a ferry, please let the rental company know at the time of pick-up to receive authorisation. Depending on the conditions agreed to in the rental contract and the company you choose, you might be charged a fee payable at the destination.
