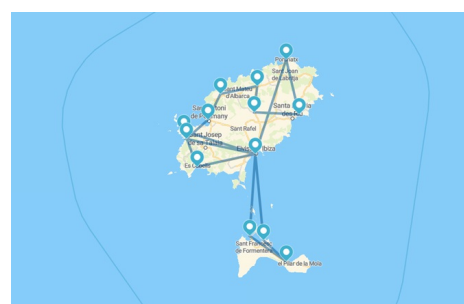




Spain (Ibiza and Formentera - Balearic Islands), 8 Days · Tailor-made by car

Route through the Pityusic Islands

Ibiza is small and manageable, but has endless things to offer. In its 45 kilometers in length and 25 across, everything is within reach. Traveling by car is a pleasure, because you can reach some magical places with only a short car journey. We propose you spend a few days on Ibiza, the most international island of the Balearic archipelago, known for its party culture, its style, its eccentricity and its nightlife. But behind that image of fashion and debauchery, heiress of the hippie movement that continues to confer an air of freedom and counterculture, hides a territory rich in landscapes, seascapes, nature, heritage and popular art. On the white island of the Mediterranean, it will be a pleasure to lose yourself in unforgettable moments. From bathing in crystal clear waters, with turquoise tones set in beautiful coves, to the sunsets that paint the sky in fantastic colors. Music and dancing are the hallmarks of this island dedicated to tourism, with its crowded nightclubs, but also with its local dances in streets of whitewashed villages, among cultivated fields, bringing the traditions of the past to life. And let's not forget about the sensational Formentera, with its incomparable coast that makes it unique.

Travel details

● DAY 1 · CITY OF ORIGIN - CITY OF IBIZA

Flight departure from the city of origin to Ibiza. Arrival and rental car pick-up. For the rest of the day, you are free free to explore the city of Ibiza, where you will love strolling through its old town, known as Dalt Vila, located on a promontory overlooking the port, with magnificent views. From below it is also beautiful, especially at night, the image of this hill full of little houses, protected by a Renaissance wall with five gates. You can enter through the main one, known as "Portal de ses Taules", where you will access the Patio de Armas, behind which is Plaza de Vila. Get lost in this old part of the city, among its cobbled streets, full of bars and shops where you can buy souvenirs and those wonderful local white lace dresses, that have coined their own style on the island. The atmosphere is vibrant, it doesn't matter what time of day, there is a spectacle to see. Have dinner at one of the many terraces in this area, where very varied menus are offered. Overnight stay in the City of Ibiza.

● DAY 2 · CITY OF IBIZA - SA CALETA - CALA JONDAL - ES CUBELLS - CALA D'HORT/CARBÓ/VEDELLA - SAN JOSE - CITY OF IBIZA

Head south to Sa Caleta, 20 minutes away, in the area of Playa d'En Bossa. You will love its red cliff faces and calm waters. In this area, there are also archaeological sites such as the Phoenician settlement of sa Caleta, built in the 7th century BC and declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. You can entertain yourself there for hours. Only five minutes away you can visit Cala Jondal, which has become very fashionable, with select beach clubs that attract both celebrities and tourists. Here you can see the eccentric side of Ibiza, with its stylish visitors. Follow the Route to Es Cubells, a quarter of an hour by car, built on an imposing cliff. You can see the convent just outside the town and the church of this charming little village. To get to know this part of the south of the island, you can visit a string of interesting coves, which will astound you with its beauty: Cala d'Hort, Cala Carbó and Cala Vedella. After a fantastic day at the beach, the route continues on to San José. In Sa Talaia is the highest point of the whole island of Ibiza, standing 475 metres above sea level and offering magnificent views.

Follow the route back to the capital, where you can still visit the Gothic cathedral with its baroque style nave of the Virgen de las Nieves, built in the 13th century, or the old Yebisah mosque located at the top of Dalt Vila, and enjoy the panoramic view from above.

You can also visit the Church of Santo Domingo, dating from the XVI century, and the Town Hall, located in a former Dominican Convent, as well as the neighborhood where the fishermen of Ibiza lived, La Marina, and take a tour of the port of Ibiza to see its spectacular yachts and sailboats.

Overnight stay in the City of Ibiza.

● DAY 3 · CITY OF IBIZA - SAN AGUSTÍN - CALA BASSA - CALA COMTE - CALA TARIDA - SANT ANTONI DE PORTMAN

Then you can leisurely drive on to San Agustín, just half an hour away. It is a beautiful and very well preserved village that reflects the authentic style and essence of Ibiza. You can visit the church and the parish house, dating from the early 1800's. Their little houses are surrounded by a green and beautiful natural environment, in contrast with their little houses painted white. Continue to Cala Bassa, five minutes away, a beach with turquoise blue waters where you can cool off and practice water sports. If you want tranquility, it is not the best option because it is usually very busy, not only because of the beach club that delights tourists, but its white sand, its shallow waters and its forest of twisted juniper trees make it really attractive. Five minutes away you will find Cala Comte, with its islets piercing the blue horizon, where the wildlife invites you to come diving. At the most western point, famous for its sunsets and for its beach bar with shop, set among multicolored shades, you can relax here while appreciating the magnificent views. That hippy touch, with vans near the sea, contrasts with the yachts that frequent this coast. Quite a sight. Then go to Cala Tarida, 10 minutes away by car. It is a long, wide beach, with fine white sand which, together with the rocks under the water, dazzle with turquoise and emerald green tones. It is touristy and popular. If you prefer more tranquility, on the far right side there is a small cove in front of the islet of Sa Sabata (the shoe) which is often used as a nudist beach. Then continue to Sant Antoni de Portmany, 20 minutes away by car and the end of today's itinerary. On the west coast, this tourist town will draw you in with its lively nightlife and its great natural harbor, a bay with the same place name and named by the Romans as Portus Magnus. You can walk along its long promenade, which connects the port with the beaches of S'Arenal and Es Pouet, and visit Sa Punta des Molí, with its mill, its windmill and a small botanical garden. Get lost in its labyrinthine center, with streets full of shops and bars. At sunset, the most popular plan is to head for the coast of Ses Variades, towards the north of the bay, where many people come to watch the sunset that paints the sky vivid shades of orange. Then, next to the port you will find many places to dine. Our recommendation: a good plate of seafood or fish. Overnight stay in Sant Antoni de Portmany.

● **DAY 4 · SANT ANTONI DE PORTMANY - CALA SALADA - SANTA AGNÈS DE CORONA - SAN MIGUEL DE BALANSAT - SANTA GERTRUDIS DE FRUITEIRA - SAN RAFAEL DE LA CRUZ - SANTA EULALIA DEL RÍO**

Before leaving, you can discover many more secrets of this island town. Do not miss its fortified church, the artistic graffiti that decorate a dozen facades downtown and the beautiful cala Gració. The main avenue is the Passeig de Ses Fonts, next to the docks and home to the Monument to the Discovery of America, popularly known as the 'Egg of Columbus'. If you visited Sa Punta des Molí yesterday, today you should go to the Aquarium of Es Cap Blanc at the other end of the town.

After driving for 10 minutes you have Cala Salada, a fantastic virgin beach, with its quieter neighbor Cala Saladeta. The area is beautiful, surrounded by pine trees. Nearby is the Fontanelles cave. This grotto, which is also known as the "cave of wine", has a good number of cave paintings which expert archaeologists claim date from the Bronze Age, although iron bars prevent you from going too deep into the caves. (Note: At present, the cave is fenced off, although it is worth visiting to contemplate the cave and the views from this spot). Fifteen minutes away is Santa Inés (or Santa Agnes), where there is the must see Ses Balandres, popularly known as 'The gates of heaven'. There is a cliff where you can enjoy a beautiful panoramic view of the cove and the islets of Ses Margalides. If you're feeling brave, we recommend going down to the cove. The road is difficult, by wooden stairs built by fishermen with rope handrails help you to get up and down from the cove. If you do not have vertigo, it's worth it. The views from below, towards the imposing wall of cliff faces with their natural features, are a spectacle. It is a hidden place, dotted with stone boathouses which are somewhat camouflaged. From here you gain a different view of the islets of Ses Margalides, two rock formations: one small (Picatxo) and the other much larger, known as Sa Foradada which is shaped like a half moon. The diving in this area is incredible, with striking backgrounds, lots of marine wildlife and lots of tunnels and arches. Continue on to San Miguel de Balansat, 18 minutes away by car. In this typically Ibizan town, complete with white buildings, you can visit its church located on the hill of Puig de Missa. It is one of the four fortified churches that were built on the island, and has the peculiarity of being the only one that has a cross plan in the shape of a T. Here you will find what is said to be one of the best restaurants on the island, offering "bullit de peix", a typical Ibizan dish. You can also practice water sports and visit the caves of Can Marça, with stalactites and fantastic views from the outside. If you continue south for ten minutes, you will reach Santa Gertrudis de Fruiteira, the gastronomic capital of the island. It is a typical Mediterranean village, with traditional white houses, some of these country homes have been converted into bars and restaurants. You should also visit its whitewashed church, dating from the late eighteenth century, and painted with gray and yellow stripes. This indoor villa offers an original viewpoint created by artists and sculptors and, although very lively, shifts your focus away from the party image of Ibiza. Its landscape, once reliant on agriculture, retains that rural touch that makes it special. Today we will end the day in the town of Santa Eulalia. On the way, and if you have time, you can go to San Rafael de la Cruz. In this small town it is worth the stop just to see the beautiful views from its church, where you can appreciate the city of Ibiza from afar, Dalt Vila and, even Formentera, another island in the archipelago. Another option is to make a stop before in Cala Sòl d'en Serrà, near to Cala Llonga. Here is a very chic beach bar and a restaurant that the famous DJ David Piccione opened in this dream location.

Overnight stay in Santa Eulalia del Río.

DAY 5 · SANTA EULALIA DEL RÍO - HIPPY MARKET AT PUNTA ARABÍ - CALA MASTELLA - POU DES LLEÓ - AGUAS BLANCAS - CALA SAN VICENTE - SANTA EULALIA DEL RÍO

We start the new day exploring Santa Eulalia, the third largest city on the island, where you can visit the Puig de Missa, an example of an Ibiza church-fortress. Next to the religious complex is the interesting Museum of Ethnography, opened in a farmhouse which is more than 300 years old. The collection includes typical costumes, farming implements, musical instruments, toys, weapons and jewelry, among other objects. If it's Wednesday, do not miss the Hippy Market at Punta Arabí, a market that since 1973 has been offering products from artisans and artists. More than 500 creators sell handicrafts, fashion, costume jewelry, cosmetics... And all amidst music and performances and places to eat and drink. The atmosphere is magical. After some irresistible shopping, head next to the Cala Mastella, as small as it is picturesque. It is located at the mouth of a torrent, protected by a cane field. Here there is a beach bar which is renowned for its fish. After a few minutes you come to another fantastic gravel cove, from where you can see the islet of Tagomago. Next to it is Es Canal d'en Martí, with its natural gateway and its charming dry dock huts. If you go up a bit, you can glimpse an irregular, quiet and stony coast, and Cape Sa Punta des Llaüts. The rock formations rising from the sea are astonishing. Follow the route to the northeast of the island to get to Cala San Vicente, but before you get there we recommend a stop in Aguas Blancas, a natural beauty spot because of its landscape of steep cliffs and the narrow strip of sand that is the beach itself. It is an ideal place for swimming because of its shallow depth, and there is a constant stream of waves breaking against the shore. The only drawback is that you have to park far away and walk along a hill to reach the coast. Cala San Vicente, less than two kilometers away is sheltered from the wind by mountains covered in pine trees. Its calm waters contrast with Aguas Blancas and it also has many services, including restaurants. For this reason it is busier. The north of Ibiza shows the traveler its most intimate face, a little crowded territory where small agricultural valleys alternate with natural parks and virgin coves that stand like refuges on a rugged and beautiful coast. Return to Santa Eulalia del Río, 25 minutes away, where you'll love hearing the legends of the "fameliars", pixies who help out the locals, accompanied by other fantastic characters from popular culture. Dine at one of the many restaurants in the town and then carry on enjoying this wonderful island. Overnight stay in Santa Eulalia del Río.

DAY 6 · SANTA EULALIA - PORT OF BENIRRÀS - CALA XARRACA - CALA D'EN SERRA - CITY OF IBIZA

Today is the perfect day to discover new parts of this fascinating island. Head to Port de Benirràs, on the northern coast, 20 minutes away by car. The drive is a pleasure, as it winds among pine covered hills. Its small bay lies on a sandy cove and is a picture postcard perfect when the sun sets. On Sundays, locals and visitors come with drums to accompany the sunset turning it into a ritual. It is easy to reach by car and there are two free parking lots, but in summer, when they are full, the access road is closed and it is only possible to get there by bus, so we recommend you go early. A little more than 15 minutes away you have Cala Xarraca, bordered by rock walls. There are a few buildings standing among the conifers, giving it the feel of a virgin forest. Take the road that leads further north to two more of our recommended stops: Portinatx and Cala d'En Serra are very close by. In Portinatx you will find three magnificent beaches, with attractive clear turquoise waters: S'Arenal Gros, S'Arenal Petit y Playa Porto. This is a perfect area for snorkeling and diving, surrounded by a beautiful landscape. Here some scenes from the movie 'South of the Pacific', by director Joshua Logan, were filmed, standing in for the islands. There are several walking routes for those who want to burn some energy for the day - including a spectacular path that heads out to the lighthouse, located at the highest point on the Balearic Islands, on incredible cliffs overlooking the crystal clear waters of the Mediterranean. In Cala d'En Serra you will discover an idyllic place, set between the sand and the rocks, where you can bathe among the flora and picturesque boat houses. Driving there can be an experience in itself. You can stop to enjoy spectacular views of the sea and the coast, between the coves and cliffs. If you coincide your visit with the sunset, it is an unmissable experience. You'll end the day by returning to the City of Ibiza. If you like the party, maybe it's a good day to go out at night and dance until the early hours of the morning. You can enjoy the vibrant and special lifestyle of Ibiza, with its famous clubs and beautiful people. Towards the south of the city, about 20 minutes away, is Playa d'En Bossa, where the majority of fashion and music venues are concentrated. It is a show that is worth experiencing. Its colour, style and eccentricities make Ibiza a different place. You'll see gogós dancing to the beats of the best DJs. Overnight stay in the City of Ibiza.

● DAY 7 · IBIZA (OPTIONAL VISIT TO FORMENTERA: PORT - LA SAVINA - SAONA BAY - CAP DE BARBARIA - COVA FORADADA - LA MOLA LIGHTHOUSE - ES CALÓ - ES PUJOLS - ILLETAS - S'ESPALMADOR ISLAND - PORT)

Today you can choose between continuing to enjoy the attractions of the Ibizan capital, or get up early and head to the neighboring island, a place that, as unlikely as it sounds, is even more spectacular. Formentera can be reached by taking a ferry from the port of Ibiza, on the Paseo Marítimo itself. (Note: It is the only way to reach the island, since it is not possible to travel from any other point in Spain. Ferry trip not included. The journey takes just over half an hour). To travel around Formentera by car is part of the experience that you can not miss. With a little more than 80 square kilometers, its 70 kilometers of coastline offer incredible beaches and superb cliffs, between sand dunes, juniper trees, valleys and fields dotted with only the occasional building. Formentera is sublime. It is peaceful and sophisticated, with a paradoxical blend of hippy and traditional styles. You have all day to discover it and you won't want to leave. In fact, we guarantee that you will return. But, for this first time, will have to choose which places to see. The best, however, is that you see which way the wind is blowing and choose the best beach to swim in the calm waters. We propose a circular route that takes you all over the island. Part of La Savina to the west, where there is a extremely beautiful and quiet marine natural park. On this same coast, further south, you will find Cala Saona, which is very popular. We recommend you to go along the coast to the right, between cliffs with sheer drops down into the sea, where you will find beautiful spots. At the southernmost tip of the island, in Cap de Barbaria, there is a lighthouse made famous in the film "Sex and Lucia". Do not miss the Cova Foradada, with its hole that turns into a skylight in the grotto, where the mix of lights and shadows make for quite a spectacle. Take a picture of your own silhouette, with the sea in the background. Continue on that road that will take you to the easternmost part of the island, where the famous La Mola lighthouse is located. The views from the cliffs that house it are spectacular and from here, the highest point on the island, you will be able to see Formentera in its entirety. Follow the route along the opposite coast and make a stop at Es Caló, where there are a couple of beautiful coves and some hidden rocky areas that will take your breath away. Pass by Sant Ferran to get to Es Pujols, a fashionable place, especially at night, when its small and friendly waterfront is full of tourists sitting at lively terraces or wandering amongst the market stalls selling crafts, flowers for your hair and camisoles along the front. Enjoy its hippy shops, with their exclusive and very original models. Continue along the spectacular road that borders the Estany Pudent. Where the salt works create squares of calm water that simulate mirrors reflecting the sky. It ends in Illetas, with its long, pristine beach, so transparent that it seems unreal. Here you will witness the most intense shade of turquoise imaginable. Please note that access by vehicle requires prior payment in a booth at the gates of the Natural Park (cars cost 5 euros and motorcycles cost 3 euros) and, when the car parks are full, the entrance is closed. You won't want the day to end. Have the most unforgettable swim of your life with luxurious yachts in front of you and walk the whole length of the sandy beaches. From there you can cross over to the water to the island of s'Espalmador, famous for its foul-smelling muds which have health giving properties. The view from the highest point is spectacular, where you can see two coastlines stretching away as a thin strip of sand. Squeeze the last moments of the day in this idyllic setting, before heading back to Ibiza. In less than 10 minutes you will arrive at the port to take the ferry back and say goodbye to this unforgettable island. In Ibiza, say goodbye to the city by returning to savour its old town. Overnight stay in the City of Ibiza.

● DAY 8 · IBIZA - CITY OF ORIGIN

Arrival at the airport with enough time to drop off your rental car and flight back to the city of origin.

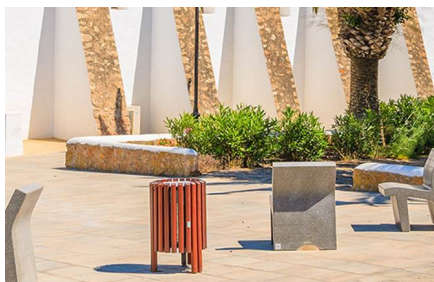

Important remarks

- Triple rooms in Europe are generally rooms with twin beds or a double, in which a folding bed is installed to accommodate the third person. Due to the inconvenience this causes, we advise against using this option as far as possible.
- Check-in time at the hotel on the day of arrival depends on each establishment, but in no case will it be before 3:00 p.m., unless otherwise indicated.
- The proposed excursions and tours for each day are purely suggestions, as you can tailor the trip to suit your times, tastes and needs.
- A credit card is considered a guarantee, so sometimes you will need one for check-in at hotels.
- Hotels usually have cots available. Otherwise, babies will have to share a bed with an adult.
- To pick up your rental car, you'll need a credit (not debit) card in the name of the person who made the booking, who must also be the named driver of the vehicle.
- Consult the necessary documentation to enter the destinations visited and for transit in the countries where air stopovers are made.
- Suggested round-trip ferry rides are optional and not included in the final price. If you intend to take the car on a ferry, please let the rental company know at the time of pick-up to receive authorisation. Depending on the conditions agreed to in the rental contract and the company you choose, you might be charged a fee payable at the destination.
