Do not be surprised if during this wonderful Route through Norway's dream landscapes you will have to pinch yourself to check whether you are awake or not. This car trip that we offer allows you to discover first-hand the breathtaking and spectacular beauty of this Scandinavian country that will steal your heart, both in summer and winter. See the amazing iridescent beauty of the Northern Lights, it being possible to see them between mid-August and until the beginning of April. Witness the phenomenon known as "Midnight Sun" or "White Nights", just over a month of days without nights between the beginning of June and the beginning of July; a phenomenon that occurs in the North area of the Arctic Circle in the Norway region. Discover the Lofoten Islands along "Olaf's Highway" ("Carretera de Olaf"), with its charming, bucolic fishing villages, fish drying rooms, its unmistakable red wooden houses, and views that will stay in your mind forever. Photograph several species of giant whales, the sperm whales being the most common to spot in the small Vesterålen archipelago; or greet the world's largest troll: the "Senja Trollet", located on the island of the same name that looks like something out of a fairy tale, where peace and silence reigns in every corner. Travel to North Cape, where the Atlantic Ocean meets the Arctic Ocean, and let yourself be captivated by the unparalleled natural beauty of what is considered the northernmost point of Europe. Embark on the mythical Hurtigruten ship for an incredible voyage through the Norwegian Sea nicknamed "the most beautiful sea trip in the world"; a hundred-year-old route dotted with snow-capped peaks, fjords and beautiful islands. Visit cities such as Bodø, Svolvær, Alta, Tromsø and Narvik to soak up the culture and customs of Norway and its inhabitants, as well as to taste the delicious traditional cuisine of a country that looks like something out of a beautiful dream.

● DAY 1 · CITY OF ORIGIN - BODØ

Flight departure from the city of origin to Bodø and rental car pick-up at the airport. The city of Bodø is situated in the center of Nordland county where you can start enjoying the great beauty of Norwegian nature; including the Børvasstindene mountains to the south and the Lofoten Islands to the north. Being located in the northern area of the Arctic Circle, you can witness the phenomenon known as "Sun of Midnight" or "White Nights"; just over a month of days without nights from the beginning of June to the beginning of July... which gives you more time to enjoy the unforgettable Norwegian landscapes. Also, during your stay you will be able to admire the beauty of the Northern Lights, which can be seen between mid-August and early April, usually appearing between the hours of 10. 00 PM and 02. 00 AM. In Bodø, the best places to marvel at the incredible colours of the dancing lights in the arctic sky are the harbour pier and the Rønvikfjellet mountain, just outside the town. The city also has a multitude of sites of interest, such as the Romanesque-style church of Bodin, which is Bodø's oldest building at the turn of the 12th century; the modernist building that since 1912 had housed the old customs of the town, one of the few buildings that survived the bombings of 1940; Fort Nyholmen, built in 1810 to protect grain stores from British attacks during the Napoleonic Wars and which is very close to the center of the city; and the cathedral (Bodø Domkirke, in Norwegian), whose bell tower is unique since its access is open to the outside. A part of the museum offer we highlight the Norwegian Aviation Museum and the Royal Norwegian Air Force (Norsk Luftfartsmuseum), both will allow you to discover this industry's civil and military history in the Scandinavian country until the days of the Cold War; and the Salten Museum, which in addition to hosting exhibitions on the history and coastal culture of the region, exhibits Viking silver treasure discovered in 1919 and which includes Anglo-Saxon and Arab coins. (Note: Check the websites for prices and schedules. Not included). It should be noted that the tourist and social center of Bodø revolves around Storgata street, a road full of shops, different types of bars and a wide range of restaurants where you can taste local or international foods. Overnight stay in Bodø.

● DAY 2 · BODØ - MOSKENES (FERRY) - LOFOTEN ISLANDS (Å - TIND - SØRVÅGEN - REINE - FLAKSTAD) - SVOLVÆR

Throughout the day you will discover one of the most beautiful places in the Nordic country, the Lofoten Islands, also north of the Arctic Circle. To get there you need to take the ferry that departs from the port of Bodø and after a three hour crossing of the Norwegian Sea you will reach Moskenes, located in the south of the archipelago. (Note: Check opening hours in advance. Not included). This small port town is the gateway to Lofoten and, despite its small size, it offers a good sample of what you'll find in the archipelago: charming, bucolic fishing villages, fish drying rooms, its unmistakable red wooden houses, and views that will stay in your mind forever. Once you have disembarked in Moskenes, travel about 4 kilometers southwest to the village of Å; the best place to start discovering the charms of Lofoten, there, the E10 motorway starts running from end to end, affectionately known as the "Olaf's Highway". The cosy village of Å is one of the most beautiful towns in Norway and, as in the rest of the region, its main activity is fishing. That is why it is not surprising that it houses two museums dedicated to fish and salting: the Tørrfiskmuseum and the Norsk Fiskeværmuseum, respectively, a deep journey through the history of these activities in the northernmost reaches of the earth. (Note: Check the websites for prices and schedules. Not included). Do not miss the opportunity to visit the village bakery, which opens its doors at 10:30 AM, that opens its doors from 10:30 AM, to taste the delicious "Kannelsnurren", spongy "cinnamon rolls" shaped like a sphere and topped with honey and sugar; a real delicacy. On the way back to Moskenes, always travelling "Olaf's Highway", you can see the villages of Tind, which has the peculiarity of having the houses painted yellow instead of the traditional red, and Sørvågen, besides being able to enjoy a spectacular panoramic view of the port of Moskenes. Just 6 kilometers north of Moskenes is the village of Reine, which competes with Å for being the most beautiful village in Lofoten. In fact, archipelago's best photo opportunity is the view of Reine from the mountains; an image that sums up the wondrous charms of this region and that you can take from a small viewpoint found leaving the village in the direction of Sakrisøy. From there, head north towards the village of Flakstad, about 30 kilometers away, which has one of the most famous beaches in Lofoten, Skagsanden; an ideal place to contemplate the Northern Lights. The village church (Flakstad kirke, in Norwegian) dates from 1780 and was built with wood brought from Russia, although it is not the only influence of these distant lands in the temple since the bell tower is crowned by a picturesque dome shaped like an onion. Continue on "Olaf's Highway" (E10) in the direction of Svolvær, which is 92 kilometers away from Flakstad; on a route where you will not only enjoy the spectacular natural environment that surrounds the north of Norway, but with the infinite capacity of man to manipulate the environment with huge tunnels and gigantic bridges. In the town of Svolvær, if you have the opportunity, you can dine at the "Restaurant Bauer", which is shaped like a ship and cemented on columns that emerge from the seabed; feeling like you are sailing on the waters. Overnight stay in Svolvær.

● DAY 3 · SVOLVÆR - VESTERÅLEN ISLANDS - HARSTAD

While in Svolvær do not miss the ice sculpture museum "Magic Ice" (located on Fiskergata Street, 36), where they also offer a delicious blackberry liqueur; and the Lofoten War Museum which keeps treasures of war events that took place in the area during the Second World War. (Note: Check the websites for prices and schedules. Not included). From the gastronomic point of view, local taverns and restaurants offer a large number of fresh fish dishes based on a wide variety of Norwegian Sea species, such as salmon, cod, herring, sardines and mackerel. One of the most popular and surprising recipes is "Lutefisk", made from dry white fish and caustic soda. Enjoy your meal! When you're ready, continue along the Route to the Vesterålen Islands, through another spectacular journey that combines modern tunnels and bridges with the charm that nature offers. Just 2 kilometers on the E10 heading east, you will find one of the most spectacular places to take photos: "Djevelporten" (Devil's gate) rock, which is literally wedged between the slopes of two nearby mountains. Absolutely stunning! In fact, it's very similar to the famous round rock on the Kjeragbolten in Ryfylke, whose images have been right around the world, but its access is much less dangerous. Whales are one of the major attractions of the small Vesterålen archipelago, located just north of Lofoten and the Arctic Circle, and extending westward from mainland Norway to the Atlantic Ocean. It is the only place in the country where with almost total security, with an estimated 95% of the time, you can see cetaceans throughout the year: mainly, in summer the powerful sperm whales and in winter the killer whales and the humpback whales. Your final destination at this stage is the city of Harstad; one of the best places in Norway to contemplate the atmospheric phenomena that characterises the Arctic. In fact, the city enjoys the "Sun of Midnight", from May 22 to July 18, and the "Polar Night", when the sun is always below the horizon, from November 30 to January 12. Harstad is also in the middle of the Northern Lights, which can be seen on clear nights; except in summer, as daylight prevents it. Harstad also has several cultural attractions, such as Adolfskanonen in Trondenes, a German fort built in World War II that has four batteries of guns, and is the only one that remains in the world. Two other interesting places to visit are the Cultural House and the Church of Trondenes, the most northerly medieval temple in the world. We recommend that for dinner you go to the city's main street, the Strandgata, where Harstad's gastronomy on offer is concentrated and was once bathed by the sea. Overnight stay in Harstad.

● DAY 4 · HARSTAD - SENJA ISLAND

Today you will return to the mainland to head towards the famous Senja Island through the E10 and E6 highways, in a beautiful journey that extends for 235 kilometers and lasts about three and a half hours. For this reason, we recommend that you stop halfway in Setermoen, on the banks of the Barduelva River. Here you can visit both the Bardu Kirke, an octagonal wooden church dating from 1829; as well as the Military Museum of Troms, where authentic treasures of the Second World War are kept. (Note: Check the websites for prices and schedules. Not included). Leave Setermoen on the E6 highway in a northerly direction until reaching Senja Island, passing the famous Gisund Bridge which is 1,147 meters long and 41 meters high. For more places of interest on this fairytale island, we recommend the National Park Ånderdalen, the traditional fishing communities that sow the littoral and the largest troll in the world: the "Senja Trollet", located in the coastal region of Finnsæter and which is one of the most recognisable attractions in all of Norway. To the northeast of the "Senja Trollet" there are the viewpoints of Bergsbotn and Tungeneset, both offering spectacular panoramic views that you will have to relive your memories through your camera due to its grandeur and irresistible natural beauty. In Senja you can also carry out activities such as cross-country skiing in winter, fishing, hiking and sliding down on tobogan rides, accompanied by the spectacle of the Northern Lights. And when it comes to regional gastronomy, where fish recipes stand out due to the area's longstanding fishing tradition, you can taste the alpine trout captured in the Altevatt Lake, the Senja cod and the Balsfjorden goat cheese; ingredients that will delight the most demanding palates. Overnight stay on the Island of Senja.

● DAY 5 · SENJA ISLAND - ALTA

Today, a long road ahead awaits you until you reach the Finnmark region, since your next destination is the city of Alta located 433 kilometers northeast on the E6 highway. Due to this distance, which in total will take you about six hours by car, we recommend that you make brief stops in the towns of Oteren which is in the shadow of the spectacular Signaldalen mountain; and Storslett, located at the southern end of the Reisafjorden that was destroyed in 1944 during the Second World War. Once you reach Alta, you can visit the local Rock Art Museum, where you can appreciate the carved rocks found in a human settlement dating from 4,200 to 500 BC, which are considered a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. It is also an excellent location for the observation of the Northern Lights, which is why the world's first observatory dedicated to this wonder of nature was built here at the end of the 19th century. Alta is also home to the "Sorrisnive Igloo" hotel, whose interior and exterior are built of snow and ice with doors which, when the hotel is closed, simply melt. As for dinner, you'll find various options in this coquettish Norwegian town, although the popular "Alta" and "Laksestua" restaurants, where you can taste both local and international food, are particular highlights. Overnight stay in Alta.

● DAY 6 · ALTA - NORTH CAPE - HONNINGSVÅG

Continue this spectacular dream Route in a northerly direction to Magerøy Island, where you can find what is considered the northernmost point of Europe at a north latitude of 71°, the North Cape (Nordkapp, in Norwegian). For this you must take the E6 highway and cover a route of about 224 kilometers. Once at the North Cape, where the Atlantic Ocean joins the Arctic Ocean, let yourself be captivated by its unparalleled natural beauty, with cliffs rising 308 metres above Barents sea level and astonishing, spectacular views. These days the North Cape is a major tourist attraction that includes a tourist centre complete with exhibitions, activities and restaurants. This is where you can also observe the curious phenomenon of the 'Midnight Sun'; a sun that never sets for two and a half months from mid-May to the end of July. Once you are ready, take the E69 highway to the south and after a little over half an hour you will reach Honningsvåg, located in the southern bay of the island of Magerøya, where you will spend the night. This Norwegian city claims to be the northernmost city in the world; although the title is also disputed by Hammerfest and Longyearbyen, on the island of Svalbard. Honningsvåg welcomes locals and strangers with the beautiful statue of "Bamse", a heroic dog of the San Bernardo breed that was a mascot of the Norwegian Free Armed Forces during the Second World War. Its owner, the captain of a merchant ship, was enlisted by the Navy to patrol the coast of the country in 1940. During that time, "Bamse" would become the guardian angel of the crew. After the fall of Norway, the ship of "Bamse" fled to the United Kingdom, where the famous mascot would later die in the port of Montrose, Scotland. Every ten years the Norwegian Navy holds commemorative events on its behalf and a statue of "Bamse" also decorates the Scottish port of Montrose, being oriented precisely towards the sculpture of Honningsvåg, in an eternal and vigilant look between them. Following to the end of the promenade you will see the Church of Honningsvåg, designed by the architect Jacob Wilhelm Nordan in 1885, standing on a promontory, one of the few temples in Norway that resisted the destruction caused by the Second World War. It is impressive to see photos of the time with the church as the only building standing surrounded by a completely destroyed Honningsvåg. Another of the great attractions of the town is the "Artic Ice Bar", a bar built entirely of blocks of ice that each year opens its doors from the month of April thanks to the 45 tons of ice! Necessary in each summer season! An experience that you will find difficult to live anywhere else in the world. Overnight stay in Honningsvåg.

● **DAY 7 · HONNINGSVÅG - HAMMERFEST - NORWEGIAN SEA (CRUISE) - TROMSØ // HONNINGSVÅG - LYGSEIDET - LYNGENFJORD (FERRY) - ULLSFJORD (FERRY) - TROMSØ (APPROX. 400 KM + 2 FERRIES)**

We propose two options to reach your next destination from Honningsvåg, the city of Tromsø. The first of these includes a maritime voyage aboard the famous ship Hurtigruten, a route known internationally as "the most beautiful journey by sea in the world". For this you must leave Honningsvåg at a reasonable time and drive through the North Cape in a south-west direction to Hammerfest, which is 178 kilometers away. The Hurtigruten departs at 12:45 AM from Hammerfest and heads south on a hundred-year-old route dotted with snow-capped peaks, fjords and beautiful islands, until arriving in Tromsø at 11h45 after sailing first through the Barents Sea and then through the sea of Norway. We recommend that you organise the trip and purchase the tickets in advance, since the Hurtigruten is not only a tourist cruise but also a cargo ship for isolated communities, and does not perform daily services in all the coastal locations in which it calls. (Note: Not included). The second option is to travel the approximately 500 kilometers that separates Honningsvåg from Tromsø by road, for which you must take the E69 highway southbound along the Porsangerfjord to the town of Olderfjord and from there head inland to Alta. Your next destination is Olderdalen, where you can board the car on a ferry to Lyngseidet, which runs through the Lyngen Fjord and lasts about 35 minutes. This is a moment for you to soak up the unforgettable sea views before arriving at the beautiful coastal town of Lyngseidet. (Note: Not included). There lives "Gollis", the largest plastic garden gnome in the world measuring an impressive nine meters and representing a gigantic Santa Claus. You can also visit the church of Lyngen, which dates from 1731, and the neighbourhood of old wooden houses that look like they were taken out of a time machine. And, if you have the opportunity, check out the fishing port where you can buy freshly caught prawns which are then cooked by the fishermen themselves. Everything's a delicacy! Lyngseidet is also famous for its goat's meat and lamb stew, opening up a wide range of culinary options. From Lyngseidet, take highway 91 to the town of Svensby, a journey of just 22 kilometres (14 miles) that runs along the coast. In Svensby you'll have another transfer, this time of 20 minutes, crossing the Ulls Fjord to Breivikeidet. (Note: Not included). You're now on the last stretch to Tromsø, where you will spend the night, which is about 48 kilometres (30 miles) away from the fishing village of Breivikeidet, sticking to the E8 highway in the direction of Nordlysvegen. Overnight stay in Tromsø.

● DAY 8 · TROMSØ - NARVIK

Tromsø is the seventh largest city in Norway and capital of the Troms region. This location gives the curious honour to its university, its cathedral, its botanical garden, its aquarium and, lest we forget, its brewery, being located to the most northern part of the world. It is also an ideal place for outdoor enthusiasts, for activities such as hiking, fishing, kayaking, dog sled rides and whale watching excursions. The best cultural options are undoubtedly the Art Museum of Northern Norway, where pieces of handicrafts linked to the history of Norway are exhibited from the year 1800 until today, and above all the so-called "Cathedral of the Arctic", a beautiful building perfectly integrated into the environment that was built in 1965 and designed by Jan Inge Hovig. It is undoubtedly the jewel of Tromsø. By the way, ecclesiastically it is not a cathedral but a church, since in the city there are two authentic cathedrals: Tromsø domkirke, the Lutheran cathedral built in 1861 by the architect Christian Heinrich Grosch in neo-Gothic style (Kirkeparken), and the Catholic Cathedral of Our Lady of Tromsø, which together with the previous one are the only two cathedrals built in wood in all of Norway. (Note: Check the websites for prices and schedules. Not included). In addition, Tromsø is currently one of the most vibrant cities in the country. Its lively nightlife and wide variety of restaurants, which specialise in fresh Arctic ingredients, are set in a mild climate that pleasantly surprises the tourist, especially considering that the city is 350 kilometres (217 miles) north of the Arctic Circle! The secret lies in its proximity to the sea and, above all, the Gulf Stream currents which soften the temperature. Reasons that make Tromsø another unique location for observing the Northern Lights and experiencing the Midnight Sun, but in a milder climate. Leave Tromsø at a reasonable hour to face the 250 kilometers that separate you from Narvik, located in the south. Drive on the E8 and E6 highways that cross the Troms region while you delight in its magnificent scenery. Narvik is located in a mountainous area near the border with Sweden and is one of the most important towns in northern Norway in terms of alpine skiing and mountaineering, with an excellent infrastructure for these sports. In fact, there's a cable car to climb the mountain of Fagernesfjellet, which rises to 630 metres above sea level, and from where you can take in a breathtaking panoramic vista of the area. Everything related to salmon fishing and diving also attracts many visitors to Narvik, as they are near the port with several wrecks scattered in the fjord. These wrecks are mostly boats which were sunk during World War II, since the Nordland region was the scene of a great battle in 1940. This led to the opening in 1964 of the Narvik War Museum, which includes among its collection authentic war-related memorabilia such as a Hotchkiss light tank, 75 mm battle guns, light weapons, uniforms and a wealth of information about the war in Norway. Narvik also has an 18-hole golf course, one of the northernmost courses on Earth. For dinner, we recommend you try "Souvas pa gauko", a dish made from smoked reindeer meat, or the "Renkok" which is a casserole cooked with different parts of the reindeer. Overnight stay in Narvik.

● DAY 9 · NARVIK - TYSFJORD FJORD (FERRY) - BODØ

Continue your journey winding along the coast of the Narvik Fjord, Ofotfjord in a westerly direction on the E6 highway until you reach the town of Skarberget, about 77 kilometers from Narvik. There you need to take the ferry crossing Tysfjord to Bognes and whose journey lasts about 25 minutes. (Note: Not included). From there, continue your journey along the coast and its wonderful islands that emerge from the sea to cross the Salstraumen Bridge, where you can witness the "Saltstraumen Maelstrom"; an authentic natural wonder where the largest tidal whirlpools of the world are recorded which can get to 10 meters in diameter and 5 meters deep! Saltstraumen has a rest area and free parking, in addition to having comfortable paths and bridges for the best observation of this spectacular phenomenon that, by the way, occurs every 6 hours. (Note: Check the Saltstraumen tide table so you do not miss it). Bodø is just 40 minutes northeast of Saltstraumen. Overnight stay in Bodø.

● DAY 10 · BODØ - CITY OF ORIGIN

Arrival at the airport with enough time to drop off your rental car and flight back to the city of origin.

Important remarks

- Driving in Norway: 1.Cars drive on the right-hand side and trams must be overtaken on the right. 2.Motorists must use low-beam headlights both day and night. 3.The allowed blood alcohol level is the strictest in Europe - just 0.2 mg/ml. Fines are very high and must be paid on the spot. 4.The speed limits are as follows: in built-up areas 50 km/h; on country roads 80 km/h; and on motorways 110 km/h. 5.Petrol stations are normally open from 6.00 am to 7.00 pm. 6.Parking is not allowed on main streets. This is why there are many municipal parking areas. Parking zones have different colours. You can park for one hour in yellow zones; two hours in grey zones; and three hours in brown zones. 7.Norway has a people-oriented road culture, where pedestrians and cyclists have priority. Pedestrians expect you to slow down or stop when they're crossing the road and cyclists don't always follow traffic rules. Please keep the most unprotected travellers in mind when driving on Norwegian roads. 8.Roads are mostly toll roads. You can pay for tolls either manually or with the AutoPASS, whereby automatic payment is taken once you've registered your car and your credit card on the website <https://www.autopass.no/en/visitors-payment>. We strongly recommend the AutoPASS. A fixed amount is withheld that will be discounted as you go through a toll and press the AutoPASS button (any surplus will be returned to you eighty-five days later). You can activate it up to three days after having passed through your first toll booth. If you opt for manual payment, you can pay for the tolls you've already passed through at petrol stations. You'll know at which petrol stations you can pay when you see a sign that says 'Kr-service' (usually

Esso petrol stations).

- Triple rooms in Europe are generally rooms with twin beds or a double, in which a folding bed is installed to accommodate the third person. Due to the inconvenience this causes, we advise against using this option as far as possible.
- Check-in time at the hotel on the day of arrival depends on each establishment, but in no case will it be before 3:00 p.m., unless otherwise indicated.
- The proposed excursions and tours for each day are purely suggestions, as you can tailor the trip to suit your times, tastes and needs.
- A credit card is considered a guarantee, so sometimes you will need one for check-in at hotels.
- Hotels usually have cots available. Otherwise, babies will have to share a bed with an adult.
- To pick up your rental car, you'll need a credit (not debit) card in the name of the person who made the booking, who must also be the named driver of the vehicle.
- Consult the necessary documentation to enter the destinations visited and for transit in the countries where air stopovers are made.
- We recommend you purchase the necessary ferry tickets in advance when purchasing your self-drive tour, since ferry tickets are not included in the trip, your journey will have dates and duration that will vary and will also depend on the time of year, your vehicle and your ship or ferry preferences. To ease the planning of your trip, please consult schedules and rates on the shipping companies' websites before choosing your trip start date. - We recommend that you check the tide table to fully enjoy the water whirlpools experience of Saltstraumen, in Bodø, (<https://www.kartverket.no/en/sehavniva/Lokasjonsside/?cityid=268231&city=Saltstraumen>) before arriving in the city, since this phenomenon only occurs approximately every six hours.
